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Bradford's latest attempt to manipulate public opinion while portraying themselves as innocent victims of a confused resident misinterpreting the borough's records is blatant.

He asserts, "None of the payroll entries highlighted in the report have any connection to Manager Flynn. These payroll entries are for other documented employee transactions that require reading alongside the employee payroll records. This latest report is a gross distortion of factual data, used to push an agenda that yields no evidence and continues to be disruptive misinformation to Bath's community."

The first set of documents in this report, available at: <https://awesome-lavender-76e.notion.site/Report-on...>, clearly demonstrates a series of events that expose the lies and lack of accountability that have become synonymous with the Borough of Bath.

Here's what Bradford denies:

1. He claims that the analysis doesn't necessarily question the legitimacy of the payments themselves. Instead, the primary concern is how these payments are being recorded—or more accurately, not being recorded—within the borough's payroll system.

2. We present the minutes from the December 2, 2019 Borough Council Minutes. I've highlighted an excerpt: 'Motion for Manager Flynn to receive compensation from the Parking Enforcement budget line made by Councilman Hesch, seconded by Councilman Kovalovsky, all ayes, motion carries 7-0.'



This represents the fee payable to the Payroll Processor.

The Borough of Bath Payroll PPD shows the amount of payroll issued to employees through the payroll provider, which is \$1,100.99.

The last transaction in the log on December 3, 2019, is PAYROLL TAX FILI 14146PYTAX CCD for \$1,774.61. This represents the borough's portion of tax liability.

Throughout the year, we observe various examples of these types of transactions, although the amounts vary. Notably, the number of these transactions exceeds the biannual or quarterly pay cycle of officials. In the example discussed, based on **Mr. Flynn's Employment Contract, this \$1,100.99 aligns with a salary allocation in his contract**, which was approved in the meeting minutes.

Although questions arose regarding the higher tax expense compared to the issuing Pay amount, considering the biannual pay schedule for the council, these payments were issued via direct check, explaining the anomaly.

3. As mentioned earlier, my concerns were not to assume that these transactions were inappropriate but **rather the absence of Mr. Flynn recording these** supplemental additional salary outlays in his personal payroll records.

It's important to note that the taxes mentioned in the Payroll Statement represent the borough's tax liability and do not reflect employees' personal taxes, which would be shown on an individual's W2.

After the borough's exit from the CRPD contract in 2018, in which Flynn had a gross salary of \$68k, he subsequently experienced an almost 25% raise and grew his salary to nearly \$85k.

The reason I'm bringing this to your attention is that **before my requests for RTK data, the only** publicly available information a resident could access was preliminary budgets. Flynn has consistently stated that these budgets are not accurate representations; they are estimates that require a PhD in municipal finance to understand accurately. Yet, these were the only insights residents had into the inner workings of local government.

One thing I don't need to see is that Flynn was listed as earning \$72k in 2019. This would create the impression of a reasonable raise online that a typical resident could see year over year. However, this \$72k was actually \$12k below his recorded payroll data. This raise may not have been in line with the expectations of all residents. We now discover that this figure might be underreported by thousands more.

Some readers might think I'm making a bigger deal out of this than necessary, so I want to clarify why this is significant.

If someone who recently received a 25%+ raise is willing to exploit the trust they've been given and abuse that power to manipulate records to avoid paying potentially \$1,000 in additional taxes, what's to stop them from using other manipulations when they felt the need? As Flynn states, these financial documents are complex and based on estimates that shouldn't be relied upon. Therefore, most of them are likely inaccurate, and the only one who truly understands what's going on is Flynn himself. This explains how one could remove over \$93,500 from the borough without anyone knowing. If you're going to do something, might as well do it big.

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Something that was touched upon but not included in that report was a comprehensive statistical analysis conducted based on the timing and sequence of events. The chances of it being mere coincidence and unrelated are comparable to being struck 25 times by lightning or winning the Powerball jackpot six times in a row.

While it's true that a significant amount of information has been released in the past couple of weeks, and some of it is intricate and detailed, I understand that many may not fully comprehend everything being disclosed or fully grasp the significance of certain discussions. Everyone is entitled to their own opinions on matters that I wholeheartedly support. However, I want to clarify that I don't share this information because I feel compelled to or for any reason the borough might claim from week to week. I do it because I firmly believe that people deserve to know the truth.

As I've often witnessed, those who speak out or disagree with the handling of matters in the borough are quickly subjected to personal attacks and ridicule, usually led by the mayor, effectively silencing them. This is only one of two times she can be seen leading, the other being any opportunity to oversee fundraising and donations. If that realization doesn't raise a few eyebrows, I don't know what will.

In that moment, I vowed to invest thousands of hours and spend over \$10,000 until I could obtain borough records that implicated them in a years-long money laundering and embezzlement scheme. I mean, I do really like jelly donuts.

While some of the things I say may come off as offensive or inappropriate, it's because they are meant to, I hope they find them offensive because I'm offended by what they've done and I ensure that if you aren't yet, you will be soon enough.



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
