I'm asking because you've obviously put some thought into this, and the materials you sent over regarding 400 N. Chestnut look substantially more structured than ordinary AI-assisted drafting.

And you still managed to dance around my original question. 😊 Has any Bath Borough RTKL material been used as source material, testing material, training material, or other input for RTK Corpus or the larger stack you referenced?
